FROM PASTOR BAR BARA:

The time is approaching. I leave on Sabbatical on May 17. I am excited and yet have some fears and trepidations. What will it really be like not having the 24/7 sense of ministry responsibilities? Will I be able to use my time as productively as in my dreams and hopes? And I will miss you and the day-to-day life of the congregation.

Sabbatical is a Biblical concept of rest and restoration after a period of time. The original idea had to do with letting the land be renewed, but came to involve people. The workers, slaves were to be released from their "contracts" every seven years. It was a time to start over. For pastors today the idea is to spend time in a different setting, doing different activities, a different routine from the norm. It is to be a time away with long hours of reading, reflecting, meditating and contemplating -- pondering. It is also a time for new and renewed experiences.

Sabbatical time includes continuing education. I (along with Bob) will begin with a week at the Festival of Homiletics (a preaching seminar) in Nashville. June 3-5 we will attend the Greater Milwaukee Synod Assembly where I will be recognized for 25 years of ordained ministry.

In June we will go to New York City for two weeks to observe and participate in activities in vibrant multicultural congregations, to see

and use the diversity of gifts given us by the Spirit for proclaiming anew the healing and liberating Good News of Jesus Christ.


As the body of Christ in this city we:

what can be learned that will help OSLC as we move more and more in that direction. In the evenings we hope to catch a few Broadway productions, including a new rendition of my favorite August Wilson play, *Fences*, with Denzel Washington in the lead role.



In July we head for Door County once again, with less company than usual so I will have more time for reading, prayer, and meditation. We do, however, plan to have the grandchildren visit. In addition I have plans to reconnect with other relatives that I don't normally see.

After our original plans to travel back to Jerusalem and the surrounding area with a group fell through (not enough participants signed up), we are making plans for travel on our own. We will have assistance from Rev Mark Brown with The Lutheran World Federation, Bishop Munib Younan of the ELCJHL, and the new pastor of the English speaking ministry at the Lutheran Church of the Redeemer in the Old City where I did my internship -- and the place our marriage!

The schedule may seem packed, but I believe there is plenty of down time in between to reflect and absorb each venture. I am very grateful to all of the people of Our Savior's for having a great Sabbatical policy and for supporting me in this endeavor. I am especially grateful to the Mutual Ministry Team which has helped me to focus and plan this time away. When I return, we will set up times for sharing my experiences, learnings, and insights.

It occurs to me that change happens -- sometimes more quickly than we realize. Who knows what changes might come about at Our Savior's in three months. I will be anxious to return and see the evolution of this place where we seek to be a part of God's diversity at work.

Pastor Betty will be available as needed for urgent pastoral care, even as she continues her call as Pastor of Discipleship and Outreach. There will be other pastors supplying on Sundays when she is off, and a variety of preachers throughout the summer. I am confident you will call on her when needed, without overburdening her or causing her to go beyond her $\frac{3}{4}$ time schedule.

I pray, and will continue to pray, for your well-being, and that we will grow together from this experience -- which is new to me -- but not to Our Savior's. Pastors here have been taking Sabbaticals over the past 30 years, so some people know what it is like.

Kaleidoscope Corner

RESPECTful Communication Guidelines and More from the Kaleidoscope Team

Our Savior's Kaleidoscope team has been meeting weekly for Bible study since returning from the Kaleidoscope Institute training in early March. You will recall William Martin's article in the April issue of *The Messenger* that outlined the elements of a plan to integrate the techniques we learned in the training into the life of Our Savior's congregation:

Being intentional about inclusion

Focusing on God's Word

Putting in practice time

The weekly Bible study is helping us achieve these objectives. We use the techniques of Respectful Communication Guidelines and Mutual Invitation, thereby **including** everyone who wants to participate. The Kaleidoscope Bible Study technique of reading the text three times allows us to **focus on God's Word**. We have committed to meeting once a week for 8 weeks, rotating leaders, so we are putting in our **practice time** to develop our skills.

The Kaleidoscope Bible Study (KBS) and the techniques involved in its practice are helping us lay a foundation of shared experience that will support our learning more new concepts and techniques. We are practicing the KBS on Sunday mornings at 10:00 a.m. so you may experience the techniques in action at that time. We are getting ready to expand the KBS by starting three new groups. Over the next 10-12 months, everyone in the congregation will have the opportunity to participate in a Kaleidoscope Bible Study group and to learn these techniques.

We pray that you will be open to the call when you are invited to join a KBS group and that you will say "yes" to the commitment to meet once a week for 8 weeks.

Have you noticed people at church referring to RESPECTful Communication Guidelines? Have you wondered what that's all about? These are guidelines for communication that the Kaleidoscope team is practicing. The team vision is that these guidelines will be the basis for communications at Our Savior's as we relate to one another in Bible study, in meetings, in worship and wherever we meet and talk.

RESPECTFUL COMMUNICATION GUIDELINES

R = Take Responsibility for what you say and feel without blaming others

E = Use Empathetic listening

S = be Sensitive to differences in communication styles

P = Ponder what you hear and feel before you speak

E = Examine your own assumptions and perceptions

C = keep Confidentiality

T = Trust ambiguity because we are not here to debate who is right or wrong.

Participants in Kaleidoscope Bible Study are asked to uphold these guidelines. We will print the explanation for each letter in the next several Messengers, for your information.

R stands for taking RESPONSIBILITY for what you say without blaming others. One way to do that is to use "I" statements such as "I think", "I feel", "I noticed", "I wonder", or "I believe". "I" statements help us claim our experiences, respect our ideas, thoughts and feelings. Using "I" statements also makes us less likely to judge or blame others for what we are feeling. Statements that start with "you" often have a judgmental feel. People who feel judged feel defensive and stop listening. Instead of "you're wrong" when we disagree, we can be more responsible for our views by saying, "I have a different perspective on this issue and this is why." "I" statements help keep communication lines open.

E stands for using EMPATHETIC listening. Listen not only to the words, but to the meaning and feelings behind the words. Try to see and feel the world as the person who is speaking sees and feels it. Ask clarifying questions that will invite the speaker to explain more fully so that you can understand.



A Letter from Dana Dutcher to the OSLC Women

Former member Dana Dutcher is serving in Japan as a missionary through ELCA Global Missions. The women of Our Savior's have long supported missionaries abroad and are pleased to have this new relationship with Dana. Here are some excerpts from her last letter:



"Thank you so much for the letter, it's always more exciting to get a real letter as opposed to an email...I'll try to answer your questions..."

What prompted this decision [to become a missionary]: that's a loaded question. Growing up in Milwaukee and being surrounded by such a diverse group of people especially in the formative years of my childhood instilled a passion for other cultures and learning about other cultures' traditions and traveling. I grew up in the church and also felt a passion to serve God but was not sure what role to take. After a year of prayerful discernment, my senior year of college I applied to Global Missions for a position after I graduated. Asia has always been an interesting place for me, so Japan seemed to fit. So now I live in Tokyo! Very exciting.

I have been here 6 months in intensive language study, which concluded March 5, which means my real job as an English teacher is about to start. I have a few roles here. I attend/work at a local Lutheran church fulfilling whatever role is needed. It is hard to start new ministries here, but I would love to do more outreach. I will also be an English teacher at a dormitory owned by the church and again at a student center connected to another church. I am very excited to start this new role and see what exciting things God has waiting for me.



All donors of \$250 or more, or walkers who raise \$250 or more in pledges, are invited to VIP 'meet & greet' with Judge Mathis the day of the event.


