I had a friend who did not deal with a tragedy in his life when it happened; he just went on. Soon he became unable to move out of his chair for hours – almost a day -- at a time. He tried to hold it all together and instead became helpless.

Healing comes in many forms, especially as Jesus gives us rest. We have an opportunity experience healing through worship with our faith community around us. Such a service will take place on Sunday, October 18 at 10:00 a.m. There will be one service that day followed by a simple, comforting meal where we'll have time to enjoy the company of one another and basket in God's healing presence.

MERU DIOCESE GIFT AND GUEST Sunday, October 11

We are pleased to be one of the congregations that will receive a guest from the Meru Diocese of Tanzania on Sunday, October 11. We at Our Savior's have long supported the people of Tanzania through the purchase of coffee directly from the growers (Mt. Meru Coffee Project) and have recently been able to respond to another need. The country is currently in the midst of an immense drought. To help alleviate hunger and suffering, Our Savior's is sending \$3,000 from the Renovation Benevolence Fund. That gift has helped the Greater Milwaukee Synod send nearly \$85,000 to the Meru Diocese, where emergency food is being purchased and distributed. The church is making an effort to reach people who have not received food from government distributions.

A delegation of 13 visitors from the Meru Diocese of Tanzania will be in the greater Milwaukee Synod October 7-20. On Sunday, October 11, one of those visitors will bring greetings and be with us for the morning. Walt and Aleta Chossek are helping to host the visitors. We look forward to this opportunity to spend time with a Meru brother or sister and hear first-hand about life in the church in Tanzania.

About a Service for Healing

What it is:

A time to come before God in prayer to seek healing for emotional, physical, relational, and spiritual distresses, as well as healing of memories which continue to hurt us. We are also invited to the altar to pray for other people in our lives who are in need of the Great Physician's help, but are unable or unwilling to come before God on their own.

An opportunity to add to the healing process with the resources of the church as the body of Christ, (elements of a service for Healing may include Confession and Forgiveness, Prayer, Holy Communion, Laying on of hands and Anointing with oil).

An opportunity to join in Jesus' ministry (and that of his disciples) to invite the Holy Spirit to work her healing power in and through us.

A quiet, respectful time in prayer and worship, opening our spirits to the flow of the Holy Spirit.

What it is not:

A substitute for medical care.

A substitute for clinical counseling.

A way to escape personal responsibility (i.e. wanting to be healed from respiratory problems while refusing to stop smoking, or wanting to heal a marriage without changing your own behavior.)

A remake of the healing services most of us envision when we think of what we have seen on TV or in the movies.

We may or may not:

Be healed in the way we expect.

Be cured of a physical disease. (Even Jesus died from his physical trauma on the cross. His healing was the ultimate healing of the resurrection. The apostle Paul suffered chronically from a "thorn in this flesh" throughout his ministry.)

We can expect:

Everyone to be in need of healing in some way. Not everyone may choose to come forward for prayers and anointing, but we are all in need of healing.

To be somewhat anxious the first time we go to the altar rail. It is a new and unknown experience for many.

Jesus to honor our prayers and respond in a way which will bring glory to God.

Privacy and confidentiality: No one will know why anyone else is at the altar or if they are even there for themselves. (It is also an opportunity to pray for someone else.)

The most recent participant I spoke with was Willie Hines, City Council President. He told me that he was active in NDF programs when he was 10 years old. He said that the experience then helped to keep him off the street, and led him down a path that eventually brought him to where he is today.

We can be very proud of the legacy of OSLC and NDF. In honor of the NDF 40th anniversary the OSLC Council designated a gift of \$2,000 from the Benevolence Fund to assist in their much needed efforts to help central city Milwaukee kids to succeed. Dear Lolita,

I would like to tell you the story of Next Door, as I remember it.

I arrived at Our Savior's in June of 1967 to join Louis Accola and Glenn Nycklemoe in a "mutual ministry" the likes of which had never been seen in the ALC before. It was to be an equally and mutually shared ministry with pastors and lay people involved.

One of my specific tasks was to work with the youth. In the next years studies faced us with the changing demographics of Our Savior's neighborhood. There was a predominance of young adult and aging. Pastor Nycklemoe was to take the lead in developing a program for aging. Pastor Accola was to extend the educational ministry and I was to work on expanding a youth and young adult ministry.

In the process, the mansions which were currently used as parsonages became resources for the ministry. It did not make sense, stewardship wise, to have single families occupy those very large houses. I and my family lived in the Brumder mansion on 31st and Wisconsin Avenue and it seem to be a natural atmosphere for the youth-youth adult ministry. The parsonage to its north occupied by the Nycklemoe family would see to be a

(cont. from p. 7) wonderful location for education. The space in the fellowship hall fit the needs for a senior program. I believe and remember that the dream for those ministries and the use of the parsonages began as the three pastors and their wives met for fellowship and conversation in the living room of what came to be known as "Next Door".

The excellent lay leadership immediately caught the vision and drew up plans for its implementation. It would mean hiring lay staff particularly a youth-young adult director and a part time senior center director. The dream came to fruition in 1969.

The call for a Youth-Young Adult director went to a recent Wartburg graduate, Byron Tweeten. It wasn't long before he had developed a program far beyond our expectations. He expanded the staff to include Frank Habib as a Vista worker. PPG and other corporations gave material to build a chapel in the one of the upstairs bedrooms. Very unique people began to appear on the doorstep and became a part of the ministry. There was Tiny Little, one of the original Hell's Angels, without teeth. There was the "bird man" to whom Byron could only communicate through whistles. And, of course, our own youth and young adults became very involved and also provided leadership to Next Door.

Support quickly came from other parishes like St. Rose of Lima Catholic Church and business corporations as the program expanded and it became necessary for us to consider incorporating the program. It had already been named "next Door" through the suggestion of one of the members. Again lay leadership provided direction. Don Mundt, a member of Our Savior's and an attorney at Northwestern Mutual Life assembled the entire insurance law department to draw up the papers for the new Foundation. Byron Tweeten, George Aker, a congregational president, and I were the representatives from the congregation.

Among the earliest programs under the Next Door Foundation was the development of the St Olaf College Urban Semester. It was held in the former Nycklemoe parsonage and was directed by James Gullikson, a young seminarian.

The story of Next Door is an important part of the history of Our Savior's and its vital ministry in the community of Milwaukee. I understand that the "Next Door Foundation" continues as a ministry to the Greater Milwaukee area. As an aside, Judy and I had an opportunity to rent a room in our former parsonage, the former Next Door location, and now a Bed and Breakfast. We could not afford to rent the room we knew as "our" bedroom.
