FROM PASTOR BETTY

Dear Brothers and Sisters:

It will be a year since the Multicultural Ministry Team went to receive the training in Los Angeles. Since then we have been working and using the tools we learned during that time. We are trying to apply the Respectful communication guidelines, and the mutual invitation during our meetings. We used them also every time we get together for Kaleidoscope bible Study. The main goal in practicing these tools is to really live out the theology of inclusion not only to read or learn the theoretical part of it.

In his book "Sacred Acts, Holy Changes," Eric H. F. Law, helps us to understand how important is to use these tools in our daily life. He reminds us that living out the gospel is the catalyst power that will helps us to be transformed.

In this book he also introduces us to the Process for Planned Change which, according to him will, helps us to be the church we need to be in this time and place. The whole world is changing at a very fast speed. These changes affect not only our secular life but also our spiritual life as well. According to him, nowadays going to church is not as important as it was in the past. People have more options where to take their children on Sundays. This affects churches a great deal and that's why he says that the church needs to be prepared to change some of our ways to do ministry. Changes, however, are scary. Nevertheless, he says

that the Process for Planned Change is an invitation to embody the gospel that gives us the courage to change which in turn empowers us to invite others to enter this process by embodying the gospel in the community.

We are inviting the whole congregation to come to the Kaleidoscope Bible Study to learn more about these tools, how to use them and apply them in our daily life.

The Multicultural Ministry Team is preparing a workshop during Lent season for all of you who want to know more in detail how this theology of inclusion works.

Let's come together to learn how to live Christ's life in our lives. Let's not just come to worship but to live the worship in everything we do. Let's not just partake of the communion but to be the body and blood of Christ in every action we take. Let the Word of God become flesh and dwell among and in and through us, full of grace and truth.

In our mission statement we say we are a church were Diversity works. Let's live out that mission statement with God's help. Amen

FROM PASTOR BARBARA:

Running on a grey 22 degree day – feels like 15 – surprisingly, my spirits rose and the depression I had been feeling left. I was praying and thinking and listening for a word about where we are as a church – the whole church – as well as our congregation and the people of Christ's body here at Our Savior's. I had just attended yet another seminar on how to do ministry in the city. While we probably will not enroll in the program at this time – since we have other initiatives going right now -- some of the tenets laid out inspired a new round of hope in me.

The insights are not entirely new, but renewed and expanded. They begin with change. Change happens, as we well know, whether we want it to or not. There are things we can do to make the changes we don't like less painful. For one, we can adopt and adapt to the change. We can also initiate the changes we'd like to see – the ones toward which we feel the Spirit is moving us.

My objective is not to analyze change, but to move us toward meaningful change. We are already working on one piece that was central to the recent presentation. The presenters told of building a church and leaders by "creating a climate where open heart surgery is done every day." They suggest that people have a need cont. page 4...

to feel safe enough to share their pain, their failings, their guilt and even their shame. That can and will only happen where there is trust. That trust, in part, means what is shared in a group is received and held gently, non-judgmentally, and is not shared anywhere else outside of the group.

In the congregation of the presenters, a cell network has been formed where people meet for Bible study and prayer. The particular pattern or organization is not as important as having an atmosphere created where people feel emotionally and physically safe. When that exists people will return, and they will ask what life in Christ is all about. Eventually they come to realize it is about caring for one another and sharing God's love.

The Kaleidoscope Bible Study is intended to do much the same thing. It will succeed, however, only if we are willing to open up and be vulnerable. It will be more successful, if more time is spent on the third question where we ask: "In this passage, what is God calling me to be, do, or change?" If we reflect on the message to ourselves and seriously consider how we might change – our behavior, our attitude, our view of the world, our understanding of ourselves as a



community of faith placed in this location by God – all the while trusting that God is undergirding us, we cannot fall. We might fail in a task or program, but we will not fall from God's grace.


This is all based on a sense of equality of personhood. If we truly believe we are equal, not superior or inferior by amount of wealth or race or education or anything else, but equally loved by God, then we will be well grounded, and community can be built.

God calls us to the transformation of our hearts. It can happen on a sunny day or a grey day. Whenever it happens, it will lead us to become the congregation we are to be.

Sacred Places Team



From Old Testament times and even further back when men and women experience the presence of the Divine, they marked that place in a special way. It could have been a cluster of rocks, the erection of a tent, or a grand and marvelous structure.

Our Savior's Lutheran Church stands in that tradition. There has always been a felt need to have a special place to honor and praise God, a place to receive God's blessing and in response be inspired to serve and thereby be a blessing to others.

Our Savior's was one of only ten synod congregations invited to take part in a structural building assessment process. This synod ministry/program is called "Sacred Places

New Dollars/New Partners." To encourage participation our synod offered a small grant to each congregation for the purpose of engaging a local architectural firm to perform such an assessment. Our synod also provided five days of training for a small group of congregational leaders to follow-up on any suggested recommendations, to identify how the church building is currently used with an eye toward additional possible ministry uses, and finally how to identify and form partnerships with neighborhood and community entities that might see the value of financially supporting the ministry of OSLC.

In January of 2011 our Congregation Council, Building and Grounds, and the Sacred Places New Dollars/New Partners congregational team received a preliminary report from Quorum Architects. All three of these ministry teams, as well as the congregation, will now enter into a process of prioritizing next steps. Replacement of all flat roofs has already been determined to be of utmost importance.

Our Sacred Places Ministry Team currently includes: Jane Bosman-Clark, Miguel de Jesus, Frank Schultz, LaVonne Williams, Russ Jacobsen, David Totten, Mike Festge, Bob Scheuermann, and Pastor Barbara.

This is an exciting time in the history of OSLC. Let us continue to pray for God's continual blessing and guidance on this process.
